


## The Taliban, Proud Boys, and the Global Rise of Religious Nationalism By Mark Juergensmeyer

The return of the Taliban to power in Afghanistan occurred at about the same time that virulent antidemocratic pro-Trump mobs attacked the United States capitol on January 6, 2021, and hostile new right-wing anti-immigrant politics surfaced throughout Europe from Hungary to Poland. Even Denmark was not spared. It is the thesis of this lecture that the global rise of right-wing religious neo-nationalism is not a coincidence. It is part of a thirty-year assault on secular nationalism that is related to globalization and the erosion of secular national identities. Often religious affiliations and justifications buttress these anti-secular neo-nationalists. Though ideologically anti-global, these movements are themselves a part of the dynamics of globalization that is transforming the world.

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
