### Seminar and Lecture Series\*

- Departmental Seminar Series for RPA members, MA students and more This series features lectures in contemporary ethnography organised by the Research Programme of Anthropology in collaboration with professors and PI members. The seminars seek insight into the dialectic between ethnographic research and anthropological reflections on topics that range from climate change, poverty, migration post-disaster recovery, human security and medical anthropology to ethics, love, human-nonhuman relations, biosocial relations, museology and multi-modality, heritage studies, music, food, business creativity, religious revival, piracy and the colonisation of space. • Thesis Seminars – public when publicly announced

Thesis seminars are anchored within the Research Programme of Anthropology with the purpose of preparing PhD fellows for their dissertation defence. Each seminar outlines a planned thesis – including selected drafts of basic hypotheses, theories and methods that are presented and discussed in critical dialogue between the PhD student, the main supervisor and two senior experts acting as opponents.

• MEGA Seminar – for scholars in anthropology

## Other academic activities:

- **Departmental Workshops** are occasional two-day retreats or half-day events organised by the Research Programme of Anthropology (RPA) to provide a forum through which our staff can acquaint themselves with each other and nurture the reflective practice of anthropology.
- Journal Club requires 2-10 junior or senior scholars to meet on a monthly basis at Moesgård and discuss a selected paper or chapter. LeGuins book about wirting: <u>Steering Craft</u> has been proposed, but not scheduled.
- **Pop-up Work Groups** are events organised by members of the RPA, where colleagues get together for a short period to collaborate on e.g. writing or peer feedback on publications and project proposals. In the autumn '22, we have a shut-up-and-write every Thursday (except 15 Sep., 3 Nov. and 8. Dec) in room 4215-32 (The Cellar at Moesgård). The concept is simple: People meet at 9 am, set intentions for the day and work on their individual things in intervals of 45 minutes, followed by small breaks and a longer one for lunch. The group departs at 2 pm.
- Moesgård Fermentation are occasional events curated by the Research Programmes of Anthropology and Materials-Culture-Heritage (MCH) with a view to encouraging the gradual 're-fermentation' of the Moesgård research culture after Covid-19. The events provide a friendly forum through which all researchers at Moesgård can re-acquaint themselves with each other – and perhaps reflect upon what a 'new normal' might look like.
- Anthropology Matters are guided academic discussions sponsored by the PhD Programme of Anthropology, Global Studies and the Study of Religion. They take place approx. 3 times a year on Fridays at 10-12, followed by lunch. Attendance is required of PhD student members of the RPA resident in Aarhus. The meetings focus on an analytical concept selected by a senior RPA member, who begins by introducing the concept and how he/she has used it in his/her own work. Attendees are expected to read 2-3 papers and engage in the plenum discussion. Two students act as respondents and discuss how the concept may relate to their work. Students who attend will receive ½ ECTS point, and the appointed respondents will receive1 ECTS point. Researchers and teaching staff are also welcome to attend Anthropology Matters, but not the lunch (where PhD students discuss matters of concern with the DoA management team).
- **Masterclasses** are occasional meetings sponsored by the PhD Programme of Anthropology, Global Studies and the Study of Religion and requires 2-6 enrolled PhD students to become acquainted with a visiting scholar or guest lecturer's work and prepare a small presentation including questions for the guest based on their own project. The guest would not be expected to prepare anything, but to engage with the students, answer questions and thus drive the conversation for about 2-3 hours.
- Ethnographic Salons are informal get-togethers for PhD students organised by themselves with a view to share PhD life experiences and discuss novel ideas, experimental ethnographic methods and more. It takes place at Moesgård on Fridays at 14-16.
- **Faculty Lunch** is a concept where staff can pre-pay lunch on Tuesday and have it served and a table reserved in the MoCa Moesgaard Canteen on Wednesdays at 12-midday. In this way, we can enjoy an inspiring <u>and</u> sustainable meal-and-chat with our colleagues on a regular basis. TBA.
